



Visiting an aged care home during an outbreak

Key things to remember for partners in care

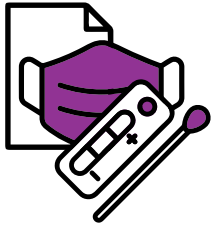
1 Before you visit

- Contact the aged care home to discuss the timing of your visit.
- Ask for information about any requirements for visiting. This may include providing evidence of your COVID-19 or influenza vaccinations.



2 Stay at home if you're feeling unwell

- Cancel your visit if you have symptoms of fever, sore throat, cough, muscle and joint pain, tiredness or exhaustion.



3 Before you enter

- Look out for signs at the entrance with updated information about visitor requirements.
- Follow all guidelines as directed by the staff. This may include:
 - completing a **Rapid Antigen Test (RAT)**
 - wearing a P2 or N95 face mask or other **Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)** including gloves, gown or eye-wear protection.
- A staff member will assist you to put on required PPE correctly.



4 When wearing PPE

- Change your mask **every 4 hours** or if it gets **wet or damaged**.
- **If you need to** go to the toilet or access your handbag or other personal items, **you will need to** ask a staff member to help you to:
 - take off (remove) PPE
 - discard PPE in infectious waste bins
 - clean your hands
 - put on a new set of PPE.
- It is **not safe** to reach under PPE into pockets or bags, take off clothes, or touch your face or hair with your gloved hand.



5 At the end of your visit

- Ask a staff member to help you to take off PPE and discard it in the correct bins.
- Clean or wash your hands. Check with a staff member which is required.



6 When you get home

- Wash your clothes in a hot cycle as soon as possible (if the outbreak is COVID-19).
- Wash your hands with soap and water.
- If you become unwell, let the aged care facility manager know.
